INTRODUCTION

The Tobago House of Assembly (THA) is a body corporate according to Section 5 (1) of the THA Act No 40 of 1996.^[1]. Under the Fifth Schedule of the Act, the THA is charged with the following responsibilities for Tobago:

- Finance the collection of revenue and the meeting of expenditure incurred in the carrying out of the functions of the Assembly;
- State Lands;
- Land and marine parks;
- Museums, archives, historical sites and historical buildings;
- Public buildings and the maintenance of the residences of the President and the Prime Minister;
- Tourism;
- Sports;
- Culture and the Arts;
- Community Development;
- Co-operatives;
- Agriculture;
- Fisheries;
- Food Production;
- Forestry;
- Town and Country Planning;
- Infrastructure including air and sea transportation, wharves and airports and public utilities;
- Telecommunications;
- Highway and Roads;
- Industrial Development;
- Environment;
- Customs and Excise;
- Licensing:
- Health Services;
- Library Services;
- Education including Curriculum;
- Social Welfare;
- Marketing;
- Valuations:
- Postal services and collection of revenue therefrom:
- Statistics and Information;
- Housing;
- Plant and Animal Quarantine; and
- Such other matters as the President may, by Order, assign to the Assembly.[2]

To comply with the above-mentioned responsibilities, the THA established the following eleven (11) Divisions, namely:

- Assembly Legislature;
- Office of the Chief Secretary:

- Tourism and Transportation;
- Education;
- Youth Affairs and Sports;
- Community Development and Culture;
- Infrastructure and Public Utilities;
- Agriculture;

- Marketing and the Environment;
- Health and Social Services; and
- Settlements and Labour.

The focus of the THA is to make Tobago "the greatest little island on the planet" through the implementation of projects and programmes under the Public Sector Investment Programme (PSIP).

The PSIP represents the capital expenditure component of the National Budget and is an instrument used by Government to affect its vision and policies. It is a budgeting and strategic planning tool made up of projects and programmes, designed to achieve the goals set out in the Government's overarching policy. It is a mechanism by which scarce resources are allocated to areas of national priority. The Central Government through the Consolidated Fund (CF) and the Infrastructure Development Fund (IDF) provides financing for the national PSIP, including the Tobago PSIP. The aim of the Tobago PSIP is to develop the island and by extension, improve the lives of the citizens, by implementing the policies and plans of the Vision 2030 National Development Strategy (NDS) 2016-2030 (Vision 2030) and the Comprehensive Economic Plan 2.0.




TOBAGO DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME - FISCAL YEAR 2024

For fiscal year 2024, the budgetary allocation for the Development Programme of the THA was \$260.0 million and which was revised to \$295.6 million as shown in Table I, hereunder:

Good health is essential for a productive life and sustainable society. As such, the Division of Health and Social Protection is committed to ensuring that the health sector and social services are robust and responsive to the needs of the citizens.

HEALTH, WELLNESS AND SOCIAL PROTECTION

Of the revised allocation of \$27.2 million, \$7.6 million was utilised for continued improvement works to hospital services, public health services and social intervention programmes. The following activities were undertaken by the Tobago Regional Health Authority (TRHA):

IMPROVEMENT WORKS AT HOSPITALS AND HEALTH CENTRES

- refurbishment works continued at the Health Centres in Mason Hall, Moriah, Castara, Parlatuvier, Les Coteaux, Plymouth and Buccoo;
- construction of a wheelchair ramp for the physically challenged at the Scarborough Health Centre;
- formation of a breastfeeding room at the Maternity and Paediatrics Wards of the Scarborough General Hospital (SGH);
- reconfiguration of the Education Department in the Administration building to include offices and cubicles for staff;
- purchase of a HP500 Hospital Waste Incinerator;
- installation of the air conditioning system at the Scarborough General Hospital;
- payment of 50 percent for the procurement of a Computed Tomography (CT) 64 Slice Scanner;
- purchase of washer for sterilisation of medical equipment;
- purchase of eight (8) ambulances and one (1) Truck Mounted Crane;
- the procurement of 12 Dialysis Machines of which seven (7) units were received and commissioned; and
- completion of restoration and repairs works to the Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) Machine at SGH;

- the retrofitting of the Operating theatre and an in-patient area at the Roxborough Hospital; and
- the upgrading of the hyperbaric chamber at the Roxborough Hospital.

Additionally, the Telecommunication Authority of Trinidad and Tobago (TATT) TTWiFi Guest Internet Services were installed at five (5) locations to enable free use of the services by guests. Other works included Information and Communications Technology (ICT) upgrade and migration of various Information Systems, such as Pharmacy, Medical Records, Finance, Lab and Radiology. This service has also been extended to patients to enable the making of appointments while waiting, the checking of schedules, reading of the news, as well as spending time reviewing public health information.

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

MOSQUITO ERADICATION

The sum of \$0.3 million was expended for this project. Ten (10) contractors were engaged to execute source reduction activities, which entails the removal of white waste across the island.

SOCIAL WELFARE SERVICES

In fiscal year 2024, Social Welfare Services implemented the following programmes and projects:

ESTABLISHMENT OF PROBATION HOSTELS

Renovation works continued at the Caroline Building for the relocation of the Probation Hostel at a cost of \$0.5 million.

PROGRAMME FOR ADOLESCENT MOTHERS (PAM)

During the period under review, the following were undertaken:

- academic and vocational training to 26 teenage mothers and provision of a daily stipend of \$50.00 per student to assist with expenses; and
- day-care services for 23 babies.

PROGRAMME FOR THE REALISATION OF ECONOMIC ACHIEVEMENT (REACH)

During the period under review, the sum of \$1.0 million was expended for the following:

- onduct of training which was held in June 2024. This was facilitated by the National Entrepreneurship Development Company Limited (NEDCO); First Citizens Bank; the Financial Literacy Secretariat in the Division of Finance; Trade and the Economy; and the Office of Procurement Regulation (OPR). There were 24 participants including REACH stakeholders; students of Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC); employees of the Unemployment Relief Programme (URP); the Community-Based Environment Protection and Enhancement Programme; and clients of the Programme for Adolescent Mothers and Community Social Services Unit (CSSU); and
- distribution of grants in the sum of \$0.2 million to 13 REACH clients took place in July 2024.

HOUSING AND SHELTER

HOUSING AND SETTLEMENTS

The Division of Settlements, Public Utilities and Rural Development (DSPURD) received a revised allocation of \$24.3 million. The sum of \$16.2 million was expended on the following:

- Affordable Housing Programme (AHP) the existing Housing/Land Development Programme for Housing Units and Serviced Lots;
- Home Improvement Programme (HIP) the Grants and Subsidies Assistance;
- Street Lighting and Electrification Programme (SLEP)

- Rural Development Programme (RDP) encompasses new projects proposed by the Rural Development Unit (RDU); and
- Social Assistance Housing Programme (SAHP) encompasses

LAND DEVELOPMENT

HOUSING ESTATE DEVELOPMENT

Wastewater Treatment Plants (WWTPs)

The sum of \$0.1 million was expended on the continued rehabilitation works to two (2) Wastewater Treatment Plants at the Blenheim and the Castara Housing Estate Developments. The Blenheim WWTP was approximately 50 percent completed; and the Castara WWTP was 25 percent completed. Photos of the Castara WWTP are hereunder:

Social Assistance Housing Programme (SAHP) - Home Ownership Made Equal (HOME)

In fiscal year 2023, the Division launched its Social Assistance Housing Programme (SAHP) and executed a pilot initiative entitled 'Home Ownership Made Equal (HOME)'. The aim of the programme was to provide housing for persons considered as socially vulnerable (inclusive of the differently-abled and persons under the poverty line). In fiscal year 2024, the programme was expanded to include the construction of 10 homes for vulnerable persons at the Blenheim Housing Development (awardees without title to land, may be accommodated using available lots within THA housing developments).

The homes at the Blenheim Phase II Housing Development were nearing completion, whilst construction had begun on three (3) additional homes at a cost of \$1.0 million. It is also expected that the programme will be expanded in the fiscal year 2025. Photos of the houses are hereunder:

Septic Tank Replacement Works - Roxborough

In response to complaints about plastic tanks, the Division embarked on a programme for the removal of plastic septic tanks and the construction of concrete septic tanks at the Roxborough Housing Development. To ensure the smooth transition, the Water and Sewerage Authority (WASA) was consulted and the recommendation was that all tanks should be standardised. Of the 77 homes within the Development, approximately 67 concrete tanks have been constructed at a cost of \$0.8 million.

Home Improvement Programme (HIP)

In order to improve the quality of housing stock on the island, the Home Improvement Programmes (HIP) distributed funding to home owners to undertake repairs to existing homes to provide assistance for the completion of new homes.

The full complement of the HIP include:

- a. The Home Improvement Grant (HIG);
- b. The Home Improvement Subsidy (HIS);
- c. The Home Completion Programme (HCP); and
- d. The Beneficiary Owned Land Programme (BOL).

During the period under review, 301 cheques that totaled \$3.5 million were distributed while 197 cheques totalling \$2.2 million were processed.

EDUCATION, RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY

The Division of Education, Research and Technology (DERT) received an allocation of \$32.9 million for the implementation of its projects and programmes. In an effort to improve its project implementation, the Division engaged the services of the Eco-Industrial Development Company (E-IDCOT) Limited for Procurement and Project Management Services for the programme that include the extension and improvement to existing Early Childhood Centres (ECCEs) and improvement/refurbishment/ extension to Primary and Secondary Schools. Some of the main activities undertaken included:

EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT TO EXISTING EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTRES (ECCE)

The sum of \$0.1 million was expended on this project as follows:

DEVELOPMENT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORT IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS

A total of \$0.3 million has been expended on **Development of Physical Education** and **Sports in Primary School** as follows:

- Tobago Primary Schools Cricket League funds were expended on the following:
 - the Hosting of Tobago based tournaments and the provision of sporting equipment, tickets and the outfitting of participating teams;
 - the attendance of a 22-member team comprising of the 15 top players from the 2024 Tobago Primary Schools Cricket League at two (2) invitational matches of the International Cricket Council (ICC) Men's T20 World Cup game at the Brian Lara Cricket Academy in Tarouba Trinidad;
 - the attendance of 62 students from 18 primary and seven (7) Secondary Schools at the ICC Men's T20 World Cup match at the Brian Lara Cricket Academy, in Tarouba Trinidad;
 - National Primary School Track and Field Championships 2024 -Expenses were incurred for the participation of students from 58 primary schools at the National Primary Schools' Track and Field Championships that was held in May 2024 at the Hasley Crawford Stadium in Trinidad. The students, who participated in over 126 evens at the Championships, were also outfitted and provided with sporting equipment; and
 - Development of Physical Education and Sport in Secondary School -A total of \$1.6 million was spent for the participation of students in sporting activities, such as cricket, basketball, track and field, netball and football. Funds were also expended on the acquisition of materials to equip the teams and for travelling expenses to and from the event venues.

MUSIC IN SCHOOLS PROGRAMME

A total of \$0.5 million was expended for the participation of students in the annual Trinidad and Tobago Music Festival. This festival showcases the remarkable talents of youths in various categories and underscores the importance of music education in preserving the cultural heritage and nurturing of young people.

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

Under the Financial Assistance Programme, the Division provided financial assistance to 120 students in the amount of \$1.7 million. This programme is managed by the Department of Advanced Training and Advisory Services (DATAS).

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AND SPORT

The THA remains committed to ensuring that citizens live in sustainable communities, which includes vibrant sporting and recreational structures. For fiscal year 2024, the Division received an allocation of \$38.5 million for the implementation of the following projects and programmes:

CONSTRUCTION OF YOUTH EMPOWERMENT CENTRES

The sum of \$0.5 million was expended for upgrade works at several centres in Tobago. Renovation works were undertaken at the Pembroke Youth Centre to meets the need of the high demand for the use of the facility and to better serve the community. These renovations included:

- adaptable spaces for varying functions/classes;
- computer stations, library/reading area and a counselling room;
- a space for administration;
- construction of new ramp stairs for the differently-abled; and
- installation of awnings.

CONSTRUCTION OF REGIONAL INDOOR CENTRE

For this project, the sum of \$1.5 million was spent for the payment of outstanding Project Management fees and for completion of works.

CONSTRUCTION OF PAVILION AND SPORTING FACILITIES

A total of \$2.0 million was expended for upgrade works undertaken at the following pavilions and sporting facilities:

- Goodwood Pavilion 45 percent completed;
- Speyside Pavilion 98 percent completed; and
- Mt. St. George Pavilion 95 percent completed.

CONSTRUCTION OF LES COTEAUX COMMUNITY CENTRE

This project which cost \$3.8 million entailed the demolition and expansion of the Centre to 4,984 square feet. The works of the project which were 86 percent completed included:

- construction of a 120 feet retaining wall (20 feet sloping to a height of 8 feet);
- replacement of the roofing system;
- installation of porcelain tiles;
- installation of gypsum ceiling; and
- construction of a computer room.


UPGRADING OF BELLE GARDEN COMMUNITY CENTRE

Ongoing upgrade works continued at the Belle Gardens Community Centre at a cost of \$0.1 million. These works included waterproofing the roof deck and external walls and the installation of a portable water pump.

CONSTRUCTION OF COMMUNITY CENTRE AT LOWLANDS

Construction works continued at the Lowlands Community Centre at a cost of \$0.3 million. These works included:

- installation of potable water pumps;
- construction of a pump house;
- construction of a new sewer system; and
- replacement of internal and external doors.



OFFICE OF THE CHIEF SECRETARY

The Office of the Chief Secretary spent a total of \$10.9 million, of which \$9.8 million was expended on the *Expansion of Calder Hall Administrative Complex Project* and \$1.2 million on the *Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Speyside Emergency Response Sub-Office Project* as follows:

EXPANSION OF CALDER HALL ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX

This project which was undertaken by E-IDCOT, included the expansion and upgrade works to the vacant building at a cost of \$9.8 million. The completed works were as follows:

- installation of workstations for the Accounts Unit;
- installation of gym equipment;
- removal of debris from internal and external spaces inclusive of the cladding, glazing, walkways and parking lot;
- sanitizing of rooms, vents and contact surfaces;
- installation of artwork on the ground, first and second floors;
- internal and external Pest Control Treatment;
- repair of water pump;
- servicing of the lobby and the Office of the Chief Secretary's elevator;
- demolition of partition and built-in furniture and removal from compound; and
- renaming of the complex as the "Hochoy Charles Administrative Complex".

Works continued as follows:

- repairs to existing sewerage treatment plant;
- repairs to the elevators;
- vinyl planks for terrazzo floorings;
- signage;
- PVC window blinds and tints;
- outfitting of Assistant Secretary's Office;
- outfitting of the Garden Terrace; and
- outfitting of an office space for Industrial Relations.


The E-IDCOT executed the works on this Centre that houses the Tobago Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) and the emergency disaster response office for the eastern part of the island. The status of the works was as follows:

- plumbing 96 percent completed;
- external wall painting 95 percent completed;
- final fix electrical roughing 93 percent completed;
- installation of air conditioning and energy recovery ventilator system -93 percent completed;
- construction of retaining walls to the front and the back of the building with steps - 30 percent completed;
- installation of ceiling tiles completed;
- fitting of internal doors 80 percent completed;
- installation of internal handrails 80 percent completed;
- construction of aprons 20 percent completed; and
- installation of kitchen cupboards 40 percent complete.



INFRASTRUCTURE, QUARRIES AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT DRAINAGE AND IRRIGATION PROGRAMME

The Division of Infrastructure Quarries and Urban Development spent the sum of \$84.5 million as detailed in *Table II* as follows:

ROADS AND BRIDGES

MAJOR IMPROVEMENT WORKS TO SECONDARY ROADS

This programme continued with Major Improvement Works to Secondary Roads throughout the island. These works were executed under the Windward Road Special Development Works, the Plymouth/Arnos Vale Road and the Smith Field Trace Extension at a cost of \$41.4 million. The works include the construction of retaining walls, box drains, curb and slipper drains, box culverts, gabion baskets works and road widening.

RESURFACING PROGRAMME

A total sum of \$8.0 million was expended on the **Resurfacing Programme** on the following roads:

- Northside Road, Castara;
- Bucco Main Road; and
- All Fields Trace, Lowlands.

Emergency Infrastructure Programme

Atotal of \$23.0 million was expended for outstanding payment to local contractors for works undertaken on emergency restoration works to weakened and damaged infrastructure throughout the island caused by inclement weather in 2022.

Ongoing Road Work

The following projects has been ongoing within the following communities:

- construction of Milford Court/Pigeon Point Connector 15 percent completed;
- construction of Bypass from Lammy Road to Roxborough/ Parlatuvier Road, Roxborough -93 percent completed; and
- construction of the Friendship Connector Road -85 percent completed.

PROGRAMME FOR UPGRADING ROAD EFFICIENCY (PURE) TOBAGO

Efforts continued on this programme to ensure that roads in communities were safe to users thereby safeguarding citizens and properties alike. In this regard, the slope along Idle Wild Trace, which was destroyed due to heavy rainfall and flash flooding over a protracted period, was restored with the construction of 132 feet by 16 feet concrete wall, box drains, curb and slipper drains, culverts and road restoration at a cost of \$1.2 million as at June 2024.

ELECTRICITY

PROGRAMME FOR RURAL ELECTRIFICATION:

Under the **Programme for Rural Electrification**, electricity was supplied to the homes in 11 communities at a cost of \$1.0 million. Over 90 persons from the communities of Charlotteville, Pembroke, Moriah, Mason Hall and Bon Accord benefited from the investment. Further, the sum of \$0.2 million was expended for outstanding payments for eight (8) jobs completed in fiscal 2023 and three (3) jobs in fiscal 2024, which assisted a total of 21 families.

STREET LIGHTING PROGRAMME

The **Street Lighting Programme** continued with the completion of 53 jobs at an expense of \$2.6 million for the installation of 435 street lights at Glamorgan, Scarborough, Canaan, Whim, Arnos Vale, Mt. St. George, King's Bay, Delaford, Campbelton, Charlotteville and the French Fort communities. An additional 58 street lights were installed in the communities of Goodwood, Argyle, Mt. St. George, Mason Hall, Golden Lane, Plymouth, Signal Hill, Riseland and Bethesda.







INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY STRENGTHENING

The Division implemented an Online Vote Information System (OVIS) at a cost of \$0.5 million. This is to allow for effective and efficient management of the Division. The OVIS is a system that would provide senior management with online information on the status of their respective votes. This timely information would enable management to make informed decisions on items/projects and supplementary expenditures. The data captured by OVIS includes:

- Allocation/Revised Allocation of each vote;
- Releases to date;
- Commitments/Expenditure/Payments; and
- Balance of vote.



FINANCE, TRADE AND THE ECONOMY

The Division of Finance, Trade and the Economy received an allocation of \$8.1 million. The following were the programmes and projects undertaken:

ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT

The sum of \$1.0 million was expended for Enterprise Development in the following areas:

- Trade and Investment Opportunities for Micro-Entrepreneurs
- the attendance of eight (8) Tobago businesses at the Trade and Investment Convention (TIC) 2024 in Trinidad in July 2024;
- the hosting of a Christmas Village in December 2023
 which featured 43 entrepreneurs in the food, beverage, agriculture,
 agro-processing, interior decorating, clothing and textile, fragrances,
 retail gift items and entertainment industries; and
- the assistance to 16 Small and Medium-Sized Enterprise (SME) to participate in Tobago Day in New York in August 2024, at a cost of \$0.2 million.





Trade and Investment Convention (TIC) 2024

Fostering Youth Entrepreneurship

Under this project the annual "Creative Tank competition 2024" was hosted. This competition allowed young Tobago innovators between the ages 15-25 to display their talents and congregate with other young entrepreneurs.

Training and Development for Entrepreneurs

During the period under review, 358 new and existing entrepreneurs and business professionals benefitted from this project as follows:

- training entitled "Managing Your Account" was hosted in October 2023 for existing and former clients of the Business Development Unit (BDU). The training encouraged participants to embrace record keeping and apply accounting principles to better manage their businesses' finances;
- a workshop for "Social Media in Business" was hosted in November 2023 for 50 entrepreneurial clients The participants attained information on methods and guidelines for the establishment of social media presence as well as the benefits derived for their businesses;
- a seminar was held in November 2023 on "Business Essentials" to disseminate knowledge on how to interpret the legal requirements for business in Trinidad and Tobago ranging from registration to the paying of taxes;
- an all-day workshop entitled "Building Your Brand's Digital Presence and Monetising It", which focused on building businesses on social media platforms was hosted in January 2024. There were 45 attendees comprising of business professionals and entrepreneurs from all sectors of Tobago's economy. The participants were taught how to use social media to market their brands and monetise their products online. The participants also got the opportunity to lay the foundation for their business websites.
- a two-day training session entitled "Business Plan Model Canvas and Cash flow Benefits" focusing on business planning and cash flow management was held in February 2024 for business professionals;

- the BDU hosted a training on "Competitive Strategy for Entrepreneurs" in March 2024. The training centred on how to competitively develop value prepositions in the face of rapid market changes;
- a workshop entitled, "Crafting a multichannel advertising strategy to increase brand awareness and profits" was held in June 2024 for all Tobago business professionals. Participants were engaged in activities that focused on interview preparation, adlib creation and social media strategy design; and
- training on Intellectual Property Protection for 75 managers and executives was held in May and July 2024. The participants also benefited from the component entitled 'Export Readiness Clinic'

ENTERPRISE ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAMME

In fiscal year 2024, 31 cheques in the sum of \$1.0 million were distributed to budding entrepreneurs to advance, enhance and drive their businesses forward under the Enterprise Assistance Grant Programme. The recipients represented various industries from landscaping, food and beverage, agro-processing and inventors and technology. The photo hereunder shows a participant receiving his cheque:

Providing Exposure to Tobago-centric Entrepreneurs

The BDU developed and published nine (9) e-Editions of their Newsletter better known as 'Let's Talk Business'. These editorials seek to advertise all unique and creative entrepreneurs in Tobago, whilst providing them with social media coverage to assist in the expansion of their market reach.

Providing Access to Enterprise Development Services through Educational Information

The community caravan 'BDU on the Go' initiative was held in November 2023 for businesses in the rural communities. This caravan travelled to nine (9) rural communities aimed at sensitising citizens of services available to them, namely, access to grants, loans, training, cooperative development and consumer rights as well as opportunities to access Enterprise Development Services. The following are the number of sessions that were held:

- eight (8) sessions of Home Work Detention were held at Hope Village between October to December 2023;
- the Division of Health REACH Programme "Wellness and Social Protection" was held in July 2024;

- the Road Market Experience 2024 was held in March 2024;
- a business theme park showcasing women in business "Women's Village" was held in April 2024;
- a Career Fair was held at Mason Hall Seventh-Day Adventist (SDA) Church in April 2024;
- the Tobago Regional Health Authority Internship Programme was held in July 2024;
- a 2- Day Public Roving session was held under the auspices Member of Parliament for Tobago West;
- the Cooperative Development Cross-Island Caravan visited six (6) villages between April to May 2024; and
- Public Service Day in July 2024.

TOURISM, CULTURE AND ANTIQUITIES

The Division of Tourism, Culture, Antiquities and Transportation has been tasked with the responsibility of the upgrading and maintenance of historical and other tourist sites on the island. The Division received an allocation of \$29.8 million for fiscal year 2024. This was utilised for the improvement and maintenance of existing tourist infrastructure and beaches. Some of the activities undertaken included:

 upgrade works to the Lifeguard Tower and Security Booth at the Bloody Bay Beach Facility which was completed in December 2023 at a cost of \$0.3 million. Works included carpentry and joinery, fabrication of railings, installation of furniture and finishes, plumbing upgrades to taps and showers, painting of the internal and external walls of the structure and repairs to the doors and windows;

NATURAL RESOURCES, THE ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Division of Food Security, Natural Resources, the Environment and Sustainable Development (DFSNRESD) is responsible for the preservation and sustainable management of the island's natural resources, as well as marketing and distribution of indigenous agro-based products of Tobago. Further, through the delivery of several services, the Division seeks to improve agricultural production and promote agriculture as a viable business option to Tobago. The Division received an allocation of \$29.2 million and a subsequent revised allocation \$38.8 million in fiscal year 2024. The sum of \$15.5 million was expended on projects and programmes as follows:

DEVELOPMENT OF HOME GARDEN INITIATIVE

Under this project a total of 102 site visits to homes and schools throughout Tobago were conducted. Technical advice was provided on the processes and procedures to apply in the establishing home gardens at residences and at schools. Objects such as containers made from Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC), grow bags, wooden crates, concrete and clay pots/bricks as well as used tyres were constructed for demonstration purposes and displays. Additionally, raised beds were constructed utilising material such as bamboo, wood, steel, PVC and galvanised metal sheets. Models of these items were showcased at health fairs, World Food Day and other mini exhibitions.

In addition, planting materials such as, 13,696 seedlings, 50 plantain suckers, 100 cassava sticks, 38 bags of manure, 211 packets of seeds, and 47 home gardening kits at a cost of \$0.2 million were distributed. This initiative resulted in 19 Gardens being established in the Bethel district. The photos hereunder show the plant materials distributed:

CONSTRUCTION OF LABORATORY FACILITIES AND TISSUE CULTURE AND ENTOMOLOGY / PLANT PATHOLOGY

The primary objective of the *Plant Tissue Culture Laboratory* project is to perform rapid, mass multiplication of selected, elite plant varieties which allow increased and sufficient supplies of disease-free plant materials for farmers. A total of \$0.3 million was expended under this project as at June 2024.

ESTABLISHMENT OF ROOT AND TUBER CROP PLANTING MATERIAL REPOSITORY, LURE ESTATE

The Lure Estate is the designated repository in which planting materials are maintained and produced for the Tobago Farming Community for the purposes of increasing food crop production on the island. In addition, this station serves to preserve selected germplasm towards the food security of the island. The sum of \$0.8 million was expended on the following plants cultivated and harvested during the period October 2023 to May 2024:

Plants Cultivated:

- 500 cassava sticks;
- 200 dasheen plants;
- 1726 ginger plants;
- 2100 sweet potato slips,
- 528 pineapples; and
- 2735 sorrel plants.

Plants Harvested:

- 53kg of sorrel,
- 44kg of ginger,
- 198kg of pineapples,
- 15kg of dasheen,
- 16kg of cassava,
- 70kg of sweet potatoes and:
- 9kg of plantains.

DEVELOPMENT OF GOVERNMENT STOCK FARM

In fiscal year 2024, renovations to livestock pens and shelters at Hope Farm, Charlotteville and Louis D'Or Livestock Stations cost \$0.5 million. These renovations were completed in January 2024. The photo hereunder shows the works undertaken at the Charlotteville Livestock Station.

IMPROVEMENT TO BEACHES AND LANDING FACILITIES

A total of \$1.0 million was expended for the following:

- upgrade works to the Barbados Bay Fish Facility that were completed in January 2024; and
- the hosting of a workshop in November 2024, that enabled 24 participants to acquire knowledge on the deboning and preparation of Lionfish. Presentations were given on lionfish identification, management, deboning and preparation. Participants were also provided with several lionfish recipes. Photos of the workshop are hereunder:

URBAN FORESTRY PROGRAMME


A total of \$0.5 million was expended for the following:


- the installation of 14 picnic tables at Courland Heritage Park and the Botanical Gardens;

COASTAL PROTECTION

MILFORD COASTAL PROTECTION

Coastal erosion continues to compromise the quality of road infrastructure as well as private and public structures in several areas of Tobago's coastline. In an effort to tackle the growing challenges presented by coastal erosion, the Division engaged in discussions with various stakeholders on data collection activities. Environment coastal studies/consultancies were also conducted at the Pigeon Point and Milford Bay coasts at a cost of \$1.0 million.





SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

For Social Development, the THA will be provided with the sum of the \$3.0 million for the implementation of a number of projects and programmes geared towards the protection of vulnerable persons. The allocation will be utilised in fiscal year 2025 for the following:

- provision of programmes at the Probation Hostels in accordance with the guidelines stipulated by the Children's Authority of Trinidad and Tobago (CATT);
- conduct of training to micro-enterprise entrepreneurs in order to enable persons to become more self-sufficient;
- provision of training programmes to adolescent mothers in parenting and home economics;
- payment of salaries and stipends to caregivers and trainees under the Golden Apple/ Adolescent Programme;
- outfitting of the Vocation Centre for differently abled persons;
- conduct of group therapy sessions for children with special needs and persons who have been referred by the Court; and
- provision of developmental and rehabilitative communitybased programmes focused on assisting parents with difficult children, parenting education, early childhood care and family life education.

HEALTH, HIV AND AIDS

A total of \$23.5 million will be allocated to the THA for the continued delivery of the public health services in Tobago. This allocation will be utilised to pursue initiatives which consist of improvement works to public health facilities, procurement of medical equipment and ambulances and continued access to renal dialysis, district dental and primary health care services. Some of the key project activities to be implemented in fiscal year 2025 include:

 Improvement Works to Hospitals - improvement works will be executed on health centres that include roof repairs, installation of security fences, sewer and heating, ventilation and air condition systems;

- Purchase and Installation of Equipment and Machinery at Hospital - purchase and installation of new equipment and machinery for hospitals;
- Establishment of an Oncology Unit expansion of the Oncology Unit to accommodate additional area for examinations and treatment rooms, clinical staff accommodation such as pharmacists and a waiting area for patients;
- Construction of New Health Centres construction and outfitting of new health facilities and the purchase of medical equipment;
- Purchase of Vehicles (Ambulances) procurement and commissioning of new ambulances equipped with disability access;
- Studley Park Integrated Waste Facility acquisition of equipment (including a shredder for tyres and plastics and hydraulic lifts) for strengthening of the waste management facility; and
- Peritoneal Dialysis Service Department procurement of additional equipment required for the provision of renal dialysis services to the public; and
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus/Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (HIV/AIDS) Substance Abuse Programme the sum of \$0.1 million will also be invested to enable an expanded HIV/AIDS response strategy for Tobago.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Division of Community Development and Culture will undertake the upgrade of a number of community centres in fiscal year 2025. An allocation of \$5.0 million will be provided to undertake the following:

- repair of the roof deck and repurposing of the ground level and level two (2) at the Golden Lane Community Centre;
- relocation of the light switches to the ground floor and roof upgrades at the Lambeau Community Centre;
- upgrade works to the Glamorgan Community Centre including the replacement of fence, landscaping, outfitting and payment of retention fees;
- completion of upgrade works to the Betsy's Hope Community Centre;
- refurbishment of the Argyle, Roxborough and Moriah Community Centres and the Tobago Empowerment Centre under the Community Enhancement Programme;
- refurbishment and upgrading of the Les Coteaux Community Centre;
- outfitting of the computer room and completion of the refurbishment at the Speyside Community Centre;
- design and reconstruction of the Charlotteville Community Centre;
- outfitting of a space for youths in the computer room at the Delaford Community Centre;
- upgrading of servers and installation of inverter air conditioning systems at the Belle Garden Community Centre;
- upgrade of the Pembroke Heritage Park, Scarborough Community Centre, Plymouth Community Centre and the Eastside and Redemption Sound Setters Pan Theatre;

- waterproofing of the roof deck, refurbishment of the stage and installation of pumps at the Bethesda Community Centre; and
- outfitting of the computer and workshop rooms at the Lowlands Community Centre.

SPORTS AND RECREATION

The THA aims to increase the human capital of the country through the development of athletic talent and community life and remains committed to the provision of the required investment and resources for the promotion of the growth of sports and recreation in Tobago. The total sum of \$28.9 million will be allocated for Tobago's major sports and recreation initiatives. The following will be undertaken in fiscal year 2025:

- Shaw Park Regional Recreation Ground and Cultural Complex replacement and commissioning of Chill Plant #2, re-routing chill waterline above ground and the replacement of the security fence at the front of the facility;
- Roxborough Sports and Cultural Complex upgrading and repairing of carpark lighting and the pavilion;
- Goodwood Hard Court replacement of basketball and netball equipment, upgrading of court surface, repairing of the fence and installation of bleachers:
- Speyside Hard Court resurfacing of the hard court and refurbishment of pavilion;
- Whim Hard Court modification of hard court to facilitate the differently-abled;
- Parlatuvier Hard Court construction of toilet and bleachers;
- Black Rock Hard Court upgrading of futsal court and net installation;

- Louis D'Or Recreation Ground continuation of the installation of lights and court resurfacing;
- Upgrading Canaan/Bon Accord Recreation Ground upgrading of field drainage and fencing of the playing field;
- Mt. Pleasant Recreation Ground field drainage;
- **Montgomery Recreation Ground** upgrading of the pavilion and the installation of exercise equipment;
- Plymouth/Bethesda Sport and Recreational Complex repairing of the pavilion and upgrading of courts;
- Construction of Regional Indoor Centre payment of consultation fees for the completion of designs for the Centre and for the settlement of accounts at Bacolet;
- Northside Regional Recreation Centre (Moriah) construction of Active Involve Citizen Programme HUB;
- Construction of Parks and Recreation Sites establishment of play parks;
- Shaw Park Sporting Complex upgrading of pavilion and courts;
- **Sports Development Programme** implementation of the Sport For All/ Total Participation Programme for citizens;
- Parlatuvier Sporting Facility upgrading of hard court and construction of a pavilion;
- Castara Recreation Ground repairing court lights and fencing of the field;
- Construction of Belle Garden Playing Field repairing of the field, fencing and court lights;
- Tablepiece Hard Court repairing of lights and fence;
- Construction of Hard Court at Lambeau resurfacing of courts and repair to lights;

- **Courland Recreation Ground** construction of pavilion, repairs to change room and installation of exercise equipment;
- Construction of Hard Court at Lambeau resurfacing of courts, repairing of lights;
- Lighting of Playing Fields installation of lights at Louis D'or, Delaford, Argyle and Jubilee Park;
- Construction of Pavilions and Sporting Facilities construction of Goodwood pavilion, change room facilities and workers' rest area:
- Construction of Pembroke Hard Court resurfacing of hard court and construction of toilet facilities and bleachers;
- Elite Athlete Development Institute establishment of a Sporting Development Committee; and
- **Establishment of Artificial Turf Facility** construction of artificial turf.

UPGRADE OF DWIGHT YORKE STADIUM

The Dwight Yorke Stadium is Tobago's only world-class sporting facility and is utilised for various sporting and cultural events. The upgraded Stadium will offer the country's athletes a modern, state-of-the-art, and user-friendly facility. Additionally, it will boost sport tourism through competitions at the national and international levels. As such, the sum of \$5.0 million will be allocated to the project for the continuation of Phase III works which include the purchase of furniture and fixtures, rehabilitation of the athletic track, turnstiles and refurbishment of the gym. Phase IV works are also expected to commence, these works include plumbing, electrical and civil works, supply and installation of new elevator, upgrade of scoreboard and air-conditioning works.

HOUSING AND SHELTER

The THA will be allocated the sum of \$19.5 million for the development of new housing settlements and for the refurbishment of existing housing units. These funds will provide support to low-and-middle-income families in their endeavour to acquire a new home, begin construction, support critical repairs and develop necessary infrastructure in urban communities. Some of the programmes to be implemented in fiscal year 2025 by the Division of Settlements, Public Utilities and Rural Development include:

- Home Improvement Grant;
- Home Improvement Subsidy;
- Home Repair Grants;
- Riseland Housing Development;
- Affordable Housing Project;
- Revitalisation and Infill Programme; and
- Home Completion Programme.

EDUCATION

The Education, Research and Technology Division of the THA, will continue with its mandate to provide educational services to children in public Special Education Schools, Early Childhood Care Education Centres, Primary, Secondary and Tertiary education institutions. The Division will receive an allocation of \$19.8 million in fiscal 2025, for the execution of key activities such as the Improvement/Refurbishment/ Extension to ECCEs, Primary, and Secondary Schools, Resources for Schools E-Testing, Programme for the Computerisation of Primary Schools, and Upgrade of Roxborough and Bon Accord Trade Centres. Activities at various sectors are described below:

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

The THA will be allocated the sum of \$0.5 million towards the Early Childhood Education Centres (ECCE) for the payment of project management fees for the construction of two (2) ECCE Centres at the Friendship and Courland Estates. The sum of \$0.1 million will be provided for the improvement/upgrade to existing ECCE Centres, works will include plumbing, electrical, roofing, painting and sanitisation.

PRIMARY EDUCATION

The **Primary Schools Programme** in Tobago will receive an allocation of \$4.1 million to be utilised for school improvements, school security, computerisation and for the development of physical education. Details of activities for fiscal year 2025 includes:

 completion of the Improvement/ Refurbishment/ Extension works to 16 primary schools including:

- the Programme for Improvement of Security at Primary Schools will continue with an allocation of \$0.3 million for the installation of Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) cameras at primary schools;
- the **Programme for the Computerisation of Primary Schools** will be provided with an allocation of \$0.4 million for the implementation of Smart Classrooms at 33 primary schools including the installation of interactive boards, purchase of laptops, Uninterruptible Power Supplies (UPSs) for virtual and hybrid teaching and learning; and
- the **Teacher Training** for fiscal year 2025 will be allocated the sum of \$0.2 million for professional development, catering for leaders at all levels, heads of departments, deans and supervisors.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

The **Secondary Schools Programme** will benefit with an allocation of \$7.2 million for upgrades, refurbishment and extensions to the following schools in fiscal year 2025:

- the Extension and Improvement to Scarborough Secondary School will be given an allocation of \$0.3 million for the installation of a new transformer;
- the Extension and Improvement to Roxborough Composite School, will be given an allocation of \$0.5 million for repairs to fencing and courtyard;
- the Construction of the Mason Hall Government Secondary will be given an allocation of \$1.0 million for repairs to roof and expansion of the cafeteria;
- the *Improvement/Refurbishment/Extension of Secondary Schools* project will receive an allocation of \$1.0 million for electrical, plumbing and roofing repairs;
- the Development of Physical Education and Sports in Secondary School will be given an allocation of \$0.5 million to administer all sporting disciplines; and
- the Resources for Schools E-Testing will be given an allocation of \$0.5 million for the acquisition of laptops for nine
 (9) Secondary Schools. Each school will acquire 30 laptops, to facilitate E-Testing for the Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate (CSEC) and the Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Education (CAPE) examination.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Special Education will be allotted \$0.3 million for the following:

- electrical, roof and air-condition repairs for the Happy Haven School; and
- electrical, roof and plumbing repairs to the Tobago School for the Deaf,
 Speech and Language Impaired.

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Skills development is the intended output of education and training. The THA will continue to enable growth in this area with the allocation of \$1.6 million for the **Skills** and **Development Training Programme** for the following in fiscal 2025:

- the **Establishment of Skills Development Centre** at Whim with the continued construction of the multipurpose complex for technical/vocational training with an allocation of \$0.5 million;
- the *Upgrade of Roxborough Trade Centre* including the expansion of classrooms and erection of a perimeter fence with an allocation of \$0.5 million;
- the Upgrade of Technical Vocational Facility at Signal Hill provision for the upgrade of furniture and equipment with an allocation of \$0.1 million; and
- the reconstruction of facilities at the **Bon Accord Trade Centre** with an allocation of \$0.5 million.

LIBRARIES

The THA recognises that libraries play a crucial role in fostering community growth and personal, professional and intellectual development. In this regard, an allocation of \$1.3 million will be provided for the implementation of various projects and programmes for the upgrading, constructing and outfitting of the following libraries throughout the island:

- **Charlotteville Library** upgrading of the electrical system and washroom facilities and painting of the building;
- Roxborough Library construction of a gazebo, installation of park benches and completion of construction works to the car park;
- Operationalisation of new Scarborough Library procurement of thirty (30) desktops and software for the server; and
- **Development of Public Library Facilities** completion of shelving, electrical and ICT works and installation of furniture and fittings at the Mini Community Library located in northwest Tobago.

CULTURE

RESTORATION OF HISTORICAL HOMES

This project involves the restoration of historical homes, buildings and sites across Tobago which will significantly add value to the island's offering and Tourism product. An allocation of \$0.6 million will be provided for restoration of the following sites:

- Goat Island;
- Speyside Water Wheel;
- Roxoborough Cocoa House;
- Indigo House, Parlatuvier;
- Windmills and wells at Canoe Bay;
- Plymouth Mystery Tomb;
- Gravesites at Fort Granby;
- Arnos Vale Water Wheel;
- Windmill at Moriah; and
- Construction of toilet facilities at major historical sites.

ORANGE HILL COMMUNITY WORKSHOP AND ART GALLERY

An allocation of \$0.2 million will be provided for the upgrading and securing of the Division's Maintenance Stores.

ESTABLISHMENT OF A HERITAGE MARINE MUSEUM

In keeping with the THA's Manta Lodge Development drive, the **Establishment of a Heritage Marine Museum** will create an additional tourist attraction for Speyside and environs. An allocation of \$0.5 million will be provided for the development of this project on the Little Tobago Island.



PUBLIC SAFETY AND CITIZEN SECURITY

TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO DEFENCE FORCE

In fiscal 2025, public safety and citizen security will focus on the development of physical infrastructure for the Trinidad and Tobago Defence Force (TTDF) in Tobago. In this regard, the Trinidad and Tobago Coast Guard (TTCG) will benefit from an allocation of \$0.5 million for the completion of ongoing works for the upgrade of the shore supply system at its Tobago Operations Base. This upgrade will facilitate the berthing of the Cape Class vessels as well as upgrade the existing electrical infrastructure to provide on shore support for vessels. Additionally, funds amounting to \$2.0 million will be allocated for upgrade works to the Coast Guard Headquarters.

Further, the sum of \$0.5 million will be allocated to the Trinidad and Tobago Regiment (TTR) for ongoing works on the Guard Room and Administration Building at Camp Signal Hill. In fiscal 2024, a Quantity Surveyor's report outlined the scope of works and the associated costs to bring this project to completion. The TTR is seeking to construct a purpose-built accommodation facility with the capacity to house 169 servicemen. In fiscal 2025, the sum of \$0.2 million will be allocated to the TTR to initiate the completion of this project.

TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO FIRE SERVICE

The Trinidad and Tobago Fire Service (TTFS) will be allocated the sum of \$1.0 million for the upgrade of the Crown Point Fire Station which is located within the aerodrome of the Arthur Napoleon Robinson International Airport. (ANRRIA) Additionally, the sum of \$1.9 million will be allocated for payments for the recently constructed Roxborough Fire Station.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO POLICE SERVICE (TTPS)

ESTABLISHMENT OF POLICE YOUTH CLUB FACILITIES

As part of the TTPS strategic goals for youth development, safety, and security, the sum of \$0.8 million will be allocated for upgrade works to the Mt St George Police Youth Club. The building was donated by the THA to the Police Youth Club on July 12, 2019. Works in fiscal year 2025 will include demolition, installation of concrete floor slab, interior finishes, ceiling and windows works, electrical and painting to walls and doors, tiling of floors and roof works.

The Police Youth Club has a membership of 80 youths and efforts will continue to engage the youths of Mt. St. George and environs to join the Club which will redound to a reduction in crime and criminal activities.

DEVELOPMENT WORKS FOR THE CANINE AND MOUNTED BRANCH

The establishment of the Mount and Canine Unit will improve the operational efficiency and effectiveness of the TTPS in Tobago and assist in the reduction of crime and criminal activities. In this regard, an allocation of \$0.8 million will be provided for the following:

- construction of a Mounted Unit this facility will be built to accommodate six (6) stables, vet and feed rooms, bathrooms stalls and necessary infrastructure; and
- construction of a Canine Unit this facility will house 12 kennels, general storage, trainer's room, food storage and necessary infrastructure.

IMPROVEMENT WORKS TO POLICE STATIONS AND BUILDINGS - TOBAGO

To deal with the upsurge of crime and criminal activities in Tobago, police officers from Trinidad are being deployed in Tobago. This resulted in police stations requiring additional accommodations for the increase. An allocation of \$1.5 million will be provided for refurbishment and upgrade works to the following stations:

- Charlotteville Police Station;
- Crown Point Police Station;
- Moriah Police Station;
- Roxborough Police Station;
- Scarborough Police Station;
- Shirvan Road Police Station; and
- New Guard and Emergency Branch /Inter-Agency Task Force Building, Shirvan Road.

ADMINISTRATION

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

The THA will be provided with an allocation of \$19.2 million to continue its programme of works in fiscal year 2025, with the construction, refurbishment and outfitting of public buildings and offices throughout Tobago. The focus will be on the provision of the OSH compliant accommodation and the creation of a safe and healthy working environment. The funds will be utilised on a number of projects, including:

- construction of a new Licensing Office at Goldsborough Compound;
- upgrade works to the Hochoy Charles Administrative Complex, Calder Hall;
- construction of new Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory;
- upgrading of Manta Lodge;
- refurbishment of two (2) main Government Quarters;
- construction of Tobago Emergency Operation Centre;
- renovation of Chief Secretary's Residence;
- upgrading and expansion of the Bucco Training Facility; and
- upgrading of the Victor E. Bruce Financial Complex.

In addition, several MDAs from Trinidad will continue to execute projects of a similar nature on the island for efficiency and good governance with an allocation of \$3.0 million in fiscal 2025. These will include:

- Construction of Judges and Magistrates' Housing in Tobago;
- Accommodation for Tobago Office of the Industrial Court; and
- the continuation of the rehabilitation of the Central Administrative Services, Tobago (CAST) building.

COURT FACILITIES

In fiscal year 2025, the Government will continue to invest in the Judicial System with the implementation of projects and programmes as follows:

REHABILITATION OF THE HALL OF JUSTICE, TOBAGO

The Hall of Justice, Tobago will receive an allocation of \$3.0 million for ongoing works to the modification of the court to accommodate the Criminal Division expansion and implementation of the Administration of Justice (Indictable Proceedings) Act, 2011(as amended), referred to AJIPAA for the following:

- civil, mechanical, electrical and plumbing works to the infrastructure of the building;
- the installation of the evidence management programme/ application, the technology courts and litigation software;
- the reconfiguration and outfitting of the building to include the Petty Civil Court and administrative offices;
- the upgrade to the portable water and wastewater systems and facilities;
- the upgrade and recertification of the electrical systems;
- ongoing works to the roof, floors, walls, columns, beams foundation, facade ceiling, crack repairs, painting and external structure;
- the upgrade of the entrance, infrastructural works as well as Dry Fire suppression systems;
- the upgrade to the Heating, Ventilation, and Air conditioninging (HVAC) systems and the installation of elevators; and
- the integration of the security system and the upgrade of surveillance, access control, intrusion detection, fencing, gates and access control measures to main entrances.

Additionally, Ministries, Department and Agencies (MDAs) whose portfolio include amenities in Tobago, will continue to execute projects including:

- reconfiguration and refurbishment of Scarborough Magistrate Court
 to accommodate the Criminal Division and Petty Civil courtrooms
 as well as an area to accommodate court offices and
 administration staff, Virtual Access Customer Centres
 (VACC) and a 'safe spaces' for vulnerable witnesses. Further works
 include structural, electrical, HVAC and ICT works;
- the Institutional Strengthening of the Family Court will continue its services with the completion of the Family Court, Tobago which include the upgrade of ICT, security and civil works, reconfigure space to include a Domestic Violence Courtroom and a Virtual Access Customer Centre (VACC); and
- the Establishment of a Children Court of Trinidad and Tobago continues with the expansion of the Children Court, Tobago which comprise of the configuration and outfitting of a building.

CAPACITY BUILDING/INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING

The THA will continue to invest in a number of projects and programmes which are designed to build human and institutional capacity. For fiscal 2025, the sum of \$1.1 million will be allocated towards:

- the continuation of training for all categories of staff in various Divisions/ Departments under the *Institutional Strengthening of the Divisions* of the THA Programme;
- the payment of tuition and academic fees for returning and new students at local and international institutions under the *Human Resources Development, Tobago Programme*; and
- **The Technical Assistance Programme** for the development and implementation of an Assembly Performance Management Framework and for the conduct a Public Investment Management Assessment.



INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND INFRASTRUCTURE

The sum of \$4.7 million will be allocated to the THA for its computerisation programmes for the continuation of the following projects in fiscal 2025:

- purchase of equipment under the Information Technology Strengthening;
- Establishment of an Integrated Financial Management System;
- Establishment of a **Geographic Information System Platform**; and
- **Project Monitoring Information System upgrade** for the Planning Department.

The improvement of ICT Infrastructure of various divisions of the THA will continue with:

- The Networking of the Division of Finance and Planning;
- The Networking of the Division of Community Development and Culture;
- The Networking of the Department of Education with Schools;
- The Secondary School Computerisation Programme;
- The Upgrading of the Project Monitoring Information System for the Planning Department (PD-PMIS); and
- The Continuation of the Digitising THA Operations.

TRANSPORTATION

LAND TRANSPORTATION

The project **Construction of Bus Shelters and Bus Stops** will continue under the THA in fiscal 2025 with an allocation of \$0.5 million for ongoing construction of 20 bus shelters in Tobago.

SEA TRANSPORTATION

The THA will continue with its sea transport infrastructure development works in fiscal 2025 with an allocation of \$0.7 million for the construction of Jetties at Parlatuvier, Bird of Paradise Island, Cove and Plymouth. The Marine Park Control Unit at Gibson Jetty will also continue upgrade works that include a kitchenette, plumbing, security cameras, solar lights and furnishings.

In addition, The MOWT will continue to execute two (2) projects under National Infrastructure Development Company Limited (NIDCO) in fiscal 2025 with an allocation of \$2.0 million. These projects are designed to significantly enhance the inter-island ferry transportation system and will also assist in improving the efficiency of the Port Authority and provide expanded port infrastructure to facilitate cruise ships, cargo and passenger vessels. They will include:

- the Development of a Marina Facility in Tobago which will involve the continuation of the conduct of an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and consultancy services for the development of a marina at Friendship Estate; and
- the Upgrade of Berthing Infrastructure of the Port of Scarborough will
 continue with the completion of the EIA and obtain the license from the
 Commissioner of State Lands, for the occupation of the seabed and for the
 construction of the jetty in Scarborough.

AIR TRANSPORTATION

The Airports Authority of Trinidad and Tobago (AATT) will maintain focus on the development of airport infrastructure at the Arthur Napoleon Raymond Robinson International Airport (ANRRIA) with an allocation of \$14.2 million to be utilised in 2025 for:

- remediation works to the runway and taxiway pavement for safe aircraft operations;
- continuation of repairs to the perimeter fencing for enhanced security;
- procurement of furniture and equipment to commence operationalisation of the new airport terminal at ANRRIA which will be completed by NIDCO on behalf of the Ministry of Finance; and
- rehabilitation works to address a landslip near the runway.

Furthermore, the *Construction of a Terminal and Associated Facilities of the ANR Robinson International Airport* project will continue in fiscal 2025 with an allocation of \$208.0 million. This project which is being executed by NIDCO on behalf of the Ministry of Finance, aims to create an international airport with sufficient capacity and level of service to support tourism development and international air travel in Tobago. Works will continue with the completion of construction of the new terminal building with a car park at Crown Point. This facility is expected to be completed and handed over to the AATT in April of 2025.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

In fiscal 2025, the island of Tobago, will receive an allocation of \$26.0 million, for the continuation of the upgrade of the island's road infrastructure. Key projects to be undertaken are as follows:

- Major Improvement Works on Secondary Roads will be provided the sum of \$10.0 million for the upgrading and improvement of secondary roads throughout the island;
- Milford Road Bridges will be allocated the sum of \$0.5 million for the final payment of the works done on the Signal Hill River Bridge;
- Resurfacing Programme will continue with an allocation of \$5.0 million for the resurfacing of roadways along the main and secondary roads of the island;
- Programme for the Upgrade of Road Efficiency (PURE), Tobago will be provided with the sum of \$1.0 million for the widening of a bridge at Northside Connector Road and installation of Traffic Lights at Dutch Fort/ Wilson Road and Garden Side Road;
- Windward Road Special Development will be allocated the sum of \$2.0 million for the continuation of upgrade works on Windward Road;
- Milford Road Bypass to Smithfield will be provided with the sum of \$1.0
 million for the construction of Sangster's Hill, Dutch Fort Connector Road;
 and
- **Store Bay Local Road Extension** will be allocated with the sum of \$2.0 million for the construction of Shirvan/Store Bay Connector Road.

DRAINAGE

In fiscal 2025 an allocation of \$5.5 million will be provided for the upgrade of the drainage and irrigation infrastructure in Tobago. The major drainage upgrade works that will continue includes the following:

• the **Desilting of Rivers** across the island;

- the continuation of drainage works in Mt. Pleasant and Lowlands;
- the continuation of drainage works at Belmont Ext. Branch Road, Adelphi Road, Mason Hall and Bacolet;
- the **Construction of Sea Defence Walls** at Grange Bay, Plymouth Back Bay and Kendal Bay to protect the coastline; and
- preparation of designs and sea defence works at Pigeon Point Heritage Park.

WATER SECURITY

Efforts will continue with the improvement of the island's water infrastructure through prudent and efficient use of water resources, for the attainment of water security.

DESILTING AND REHABILITATION OF HILLSBOROUGH DAM IN TOBAGO, PHASES 1 AND 2

The continuation of the rehabilitation of the Hillsborough Dam will improve the security of the water supply, spreading service to underserved or unserved areas, while at the same time increasing water reserves. In this regard, an amount of \$4.0 million will be utilised in fiscal year 2025 for the continued execution of works towards repair of cracks on the spillway wall of the Hillsborough Dam.

ELECTRICITY

In fiscal year 2025, the THA will continue to collaborate with the Trinidad and Tobago Electricity Commission (T&TEC) for the continuation of the Rural Electrification and Street Lighting Programmes. The major initiatives that will be undertaken include:

- the extension of electricity supply to households in selected areas in Tobago through the **Rural Electrification Programme**; and
- the provision of street lighting throughout Tobago under the **Street Lighting Programme.**



ECONOMIC RESTRUCTURING AND TRANSFORMATION

The THA has identified initiatives aimed at supporting business development and entrepreneurship in Tobago. With an injection of \$5.3 million, the Division of Finance, Trade and the Economy will continue its implementation of various programmes and projects towards the growth and development of start-ups and existing businesses in Tobago. The unit will also seek to encourage direct local and foreign investments, increasing the pool of support available to the business sector. Some of the initiatives implemented includes loan, grants, business development, outreach, business coaching and mentoring through the following programmes:

- Venture Capital;
- Enterprise Assistance Grant Programme;
- Enterprise Development;
- Business Incubator Programme; and
- Enterprise Development Company of Tobago.

AGRICULTURE FOR FOOD SECURITY

The Division of Food Security, Natural Resources, the Environment and Sustainable Development of the THA is charged with the responsibility of improving agricultural production and promoting agriculture as a viable business in Tobago, through the delivery of a number of projects and programmes. An overall investment of \$20.1 million will be provided for the following key areas:

LAND MANAGEMENT

- Agriculture Access Roads, Tobago construction of new access roads to farmlands, construction of cylindrical drains and clearing of landslides and overhangs;
- **Construction of Marketing Facilities** construction of two (2) new market facilities to accommodate vendors at Roxborough and Mason Hall;
- Establishment of Root and Tuber Crop Planning material repository Lure Estate Tobago - construction of a perimeter fence, upgrading of the irrigation system and installation of electrical supply;
- Indian Walk Root Crop Food Security land preparation, sourcing of planting materials (yam and breadfruit), pest and disease management and crop husbandry; and

• Goldsborough Agricultural Estate Irrigation Project - upgrading of the plumbing the electrical systems.

FISHING FACILITIES

- Improvement to Beaches and Landing Facilities upgrading of the Scarborough Fish facility, repairing of the plumbing and sewerage systems at the Lambeau Fish facility; and
- **Flying Fish Processing** development of a Flying Fish Development Plan through stakeholder consultations.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

- **Development of Research Unit (Crops and Livestock)** the establishment of a unit to carry out research into various types of model farms and to facilitate the development of farmland to accommodate the relevant infrastructure; and
- **Cocoa Rehabilitation** conduct research in methods of cocoa production, pest and disease management, sourcing and planting.

TOURISM

The tourism sector in Tobago will be allocated the sum of \$15.7 million with the objective of showcasing the island through the promotion of quality, distinctive, and varied products. The major goal will be to market Tobago as a top travel destination by highlighting competitive locations and attractions that adhere to worldwide standards through the following projects:

- Fort King George Heritage Park restoration of two historical buildings, perimeter and security lighting, upgrade to air-condition system at the Fine Arts Centre, construction of a suspended deck and decking and restoration of lighthouse;
- Store Bay Beach Facility electrical upgrade, construction of a drainage system, installation of security fence and general overhaul of the facility;
- Mt. Irvine Beach Facility upgrade of lifeguard towers and security booth, extension of staff quarters, refurbishment of the wastewater treatment plant and construction of concessionaire spaces;

- **Community Awareness Programme** the provision of public awareness initiatives of tourism to the Tobago economy;
- Trinidad and Tobago Hospitality and Tourism Institute Tobago Campus


 expansion of the institute academic offerings and increased programme demand;
- Tourism Support Projects (Assistance to Traumatised Visitors) providing assistance to traumatised visitors;
- Tourism Support Projects Island Wide Signage continuation of the upgrade and installation of historical signs at sea and airports, rain forest and beach facilities, branding of guard booths at tourism sites and attractions and the installation of kiosks;
- **Scarborough Beautification Project** the incorporation of the tourism product into the Scarborough redevelopment project;
- **Restoration of Historical Sites** Restorative works to Gang Sarah grave site, ANR Robinson grave site, Alvin House, Fort James, Courlanders Monument, Fort Bennett, Fort Milford, Flag Staff and Fort Campbleton;
- Lay Byes (Bloody Bay, Lambeau and Roxborough) construction of laybyes at Roxborough and Mt. Dillon;
- Bloody Bay Nature Park and Lookout upgrade of building superstructure, electrical fixtures and plumbing, fencing of compound and installation of a camera surveillance system;
- **Tourism Regulatory and Framework** consultation on the development of the legal framework to regulate the tourism industry;
- Construction of Lifeguard Towers construction of lifeguard towers at Courland Bay Facility;
- **Pigeon Point Infrastructure Works** expansion of the jazz site, the construction of a three-bedroom eco-villas and a boardwalk;

- King's Bay Beach Facility upgrade of the beach facility and lifeguard station, landscaping, construction of cabanas and guard booth and dredging of river at King Bay Waterfalls;
- Speyside Lookout landscaping, perimeter fencing, lighting and installation of signage and water supply;
- **Historical Site Cove Estate** restoration of sugar mill and windmill, clearing of land and the establishment of a heritage trail;
- Fort Granby Beach Facility upgrades to guard booth, perimeter fencing and installation of a playpark;
- Bloody Bay Beach Facility installation of a wastewater treatment plant, upgrade of the facility and beach grading (removal of excessive stones and replacing with sand);
- Rockly Bay Research Project purchase of laboratory equipment to resume restoration works at Rockly Bay Museum;
- Establishment of Tobago Marinas conduct of feasibility study;
- Construction of Tobago Cruise Ship Berths conduct of feasibility study;
- **Top River Falls Parlatuvier** construction of a bridge, washrooms, walkway, interactive centre, staff accommodation and car park;
- Englishman's Bay Beach Facility conduct of feasibility study;
- Castara Waterfall construction of a bridge, a walkway, washrooms and staff accommodation;
- **Charlotteville Beach Facility** upgrades to the concessionaire and construction of wheelchair access from carpark to washrooms; and
- **Tobago Tourism Agency** the promotion and marketing of Tobago as tourist destination and the Industry Upgrade Reimbursement Initiative Tourism Accommodation Upgrade Project (TAUP).

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The THA remains committed to enhancing youth engagement and participation through the creation and implementation of innovative projects and programmes at the individual, group, and community levels, with a \$7.5 million allocation for the following will be undertaken in fiscal year 2025:

- Construction of the Youth Development Centre (Castara) to create safer communities by ensuring that Youth Centre Facilities in the Northern District are accessible and fully equipped;
- **Specialised Youth Services Programme** will address core issues affecting youths through targeted interventions;
- Mobile Youth Health Centre will focus on holistic youth health and well-being through social education and intervention services;
- Construction of the Youth Empowerment Centre to foster safer and more peaceful communities;
- **Expansion of Mardon House Youth Development Centre** will support the current youth development agenda through enhanced development and training opportunities;
- **Establishment of Project Implementation Unit** will oversee the implementation of the Division's Operational Plan;
- **Construction of Multi-Purpose Centres** involves upgrading equipment and resources at Youth Development Centres and Zones in line with the Youth Empowerment Strategy;
- **Establishment of a Management Information System** for the acquisition of computers hardware/software to digitalise the department's services and operations; and
- **Youth Power Programme** to foster civic participation and engagement among youth, empowering them to take charge of their development and contribute to Tobago's overall progress.



ENVIRONMENT

In fiscal year 2024, the THA achieved significant progress in environmental management and forestry. In fiscal year 2025, an allocation of \$2.75 million will be invested in the following projects, which will reflect a commitment to enhancing Tobago's environmental resilience and sustainability through comprehensive management and innovative solutions:

- Agro-Forestry and Upper Water Shed Management for surveying and conducting a feasibility study of the Courland Watershed area to design a plan for rehabilitation and reforestation efforts, as well as conducting an inventory of breadfruit trees on the island;
- Urban Forestry Programme for carrying out reforestation and rehabilitation activities across Tobago on denuded or degraded lands. This includes site selection and demarcation, site preparation, planting and maintaining saplings, propagating desired tree species, and establishing fire trails;
- Friendship Estate Agro-Park Development for acquiring protected structures, tools, equipment, an irrigation system, and agricultural supplies;
- Development of Home Garden Initiative for introducing new home gardening techniques through training and awareness programs, creating home garden start-up kits, sourcing and distributing planting materials, developing model gardens, and organising Home Garden Competitions to enhance basic food security on the island;
- Climate Change Monitoring and Mitigation Comprehensive Metrological Database – for implementing climate mitigation and adaptation measures, including ecosystem protection and rehabilitation in areas of concern such as Kiligwyn Wetlands, Petit Trou Wetlands, and Little Rockley Bay Wetlands. This includes purchasing materials and equipment, hiring and training personnel, and installing signage and security systems at two locations in Southwest and Northern Tobago;
- Water Quality Monitoring Programme for purchasing equipment and establishing a testing facility, including equipment for monitoring water and sediment in areas affected by the Gulf Stream oil spill in February 2024;


- **Air Quality Monitoring in Tobago** for installing equipment and enclosures for monitoring stations, as well as purchasing specialised software and computers for data analysis;
- Mangrove Systems Inventory and Monitoring for the establishment
 of monitoring plots, conducting flora and fauna surveys, collecting
 water quality data, gathering live samples, and performing laboratory
 analyses, including assessments of areas affected by the Gulfstream Oil
 Spill in February 2024;
- **Sargassum Response** to address the use of equipment and methods for removing sargassum seaweed from major beaches in Tobago and to manage the disposal of the collected debris; and
- *Invasive Plants Control Project* for researching, identifying, and managing infestations of invasive species in designated areas.


